






Conservation measures successful in reversing decline.

NSW Coast-wide success:

110 pairs in the mid 1980's 170 pairs in the mid 1990's, 500 in 2008.



Lake Wollumboola's success:

Fledglings:

1 in 2004/5

40 in 2005/6

48 in 2006/7

62 in 2007/8 – a record for the South Coast (50 pairs,78 nests, 164 eggs 102 hatchlings, 1.24 fledglings to each breeding pair) Features of the Conservation program at Lake Wollumboola

- •co-operative partnership between the Shorebird Volunteers, DECC, SCC and the SRCMA.
- suite of conservation measures to reduce threats.
- major on-site role for volunteers.
- community education activities.
